① Bell Buckle

Established in 1852, the town of Bell Buckle has become known for its array of antiques, quilts, handmade crafts, country music, home cooking, and Southern hospitality. Beautifully restored Victorian houses and churches surround the town square. Thousands of visitors are drawn each year to visit the charming downtown with its shops and eateries and to participate in the festivals.

Bluebird Antiques and Ice Cream Parlor – Turn-of-the-century soda bar, homemade waffle cones, hand-dipped ice cream, old-fashioned banana splits, fudge. Located on the square or call 931-389-6549.

Bell Buckle Café – Barbeque, lemonade, down home cooking. Live music Thursday – Saturday nights. Live radio show on Saturday 1-3p.m. WLIJ 1580 AM. Located on the square or call 931-389-9693.

Bell Buckle Antique Mall – Antiques, collectibles, glassware, linens, quilts, tools and primitives in this old mill. Mayor Linda Key, owner/operator. Located at 112 Mainstreet or call 931-389-6174.

② Chapel Hill

This small town of a thousand residents has several small shops and restaurants. It hosts a number of festivals and agricultural events in the summertime. Chapel Hill was the birthplace of Nathan Bedford Forrest, a famous, or infamous, Confederate general in the Civil War. A monument stands outside of his old homestead.

Henry Horton State Park – Set in the rolling hills of Middle Tennessee, the eleven hundred acre Henry Horton State Park is located on the former estate of the late Henry H. Horton, the thirty-sixth governor of Tennessee. Located on the shores of the historic Duck River, the park provides hours of recreational enjoyment for the day or a weekend getaway in picturesque, pastoral Middle Tennessee. Activities to enjoy at the park include a swimming pool, picnic facilities, volleyball, disc golf, baseball, basketball court, tennis and playground. There are five skeet fields, two trap fields, lodge building with concessions, gun rental and ammo available. There is also an eighteen hole, par seventy-two championship golf course that is open seven days a week and closed only on Christmas.

③ Lewisburg

The Act of 1836, which created Marshall County, specified that the county seat be named Lewisburg to commemorate the deeds of frontier explorer Meriwether Lewis. Lewisburg was incorporated in 1837, on a site of fifty acres donated for civic purpose. Until 1925, the community served the area principally as a trading and shipping center for its

livestock and farm produce. Today, modern Lewisburg/Marshall County is the home of several nationally known industries and the World Headquarters of the Tennessee Walking Horse Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association.

Tennessee Walking Horse Association – The world headquarters where all registrations, transfers and decisions concerning the Tennessee Walking Horses are made.

Three Bandits Hunt Club – Fourteen stations with a fully automatic clay target course. NCSA and NAGPA approved. Easy walking, golf cart accessible, outdoor pavilion. Located at 358 Jack Pickle Lane or call 931-359-3587.

The Dixie Theatre - The Dixie Theatre has been a part of Lewisburg since 1913 and is now located on the north side of the square. It ceased being a movie theatre in 1985, and in 1994 the Marshall County Community Theatre bought the Dixie and renovated the interior. The theatre is designed to seat three hundred people and is booked with rehearsals and performances over two hundred days a year. Call 931-270-5729.

④ Lynchburg

Home to the nation's oldest registered distillery, Jack Daniels, Lynchburg is a step back in time. Surrounding the square are several unique, character-filled shops and restaurants. During business hours, you are sure to hear the sound of music coming from a shop nearby. You will find everything from Jack Daniels collectibles, handicrafts of all kinds, to antiques from the Civil War.

Miss Mary Bobo's Boarding House – Just off the town square in Lynchburg is Miss Mary Bobo's Boarding House where Mr. Jack Daniels took many a noonday meal. It's a Lynchburg tradition that started as a traveler's hotel back in 1867. Since 1984, Jack Daniel's great-grandniece, Miss Lynne Tolley, has been the proprietress of Miss Mary's. It's no longer a boarding house, but it's a great place for a real home-cooked meal, experiencing Southern hospitality at its best and even making some new friends. Dinner is served at eleven a.m. and one p.m., Monday through Saturday. Reservations are strongly suggested. Call 931-759-7394.

Jack Daniels Distillery – This is perhaps the nation's most famous whiskey. Licensed in 1866, the distillery continues to make its old-time Tennessee sipping whiskey the way Mr. Jack did back in 1866. Tours are available every day except Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve day, Christmas, New Year's Eve day and New Year's Day. Tours last about an hour and fifteen minutes and start every fifteen minutes or so. No samples. It's a dry county! Call 877-774-7487.

Tennessee Walking Horse Museum – This is the only museum dedicated to the world-renowned Tennessee Walking Horse. Admission is free. Hours are Tuesday through Saturday ten a.m. to four p.m.. Located on the town

⑤ Shelbyville

The seat of Bedford County, Shelbyville was established in 1809 after Clement Cannon donated one hundred acres of land to start the town. The town square has served as the archetype for numerous other towns' squares throughout the nation. The Tennessee Walking Horse Celebration is held every fall in Shelbyville at the Celebrations Grounds. The town is nicknamed the 'Pencil City' after its historical importance to pencil manufacturing.

Bridlewood Farm – This is the largest breeding farm for the Tennessee Walking Horse. It is the home of several World Grand Champions and the industries top-producing stallions. The beautifully landscaped two hundred and fifty acre farm includes a stallion center, a state of the art breeding barn, broodmare barns, exercise paddocks, and specially designed pastures built for the efficiency and safety for the horses. Visitors are always welcome and guided tours are available. Call 931-389-0401.

Normandy Dam and Reservoir – This natural area provides fishing, boating, camping, and access to the Duck River for canoes and small craft. The Duck River is stocked with trout and other game fish. Call 800-624-7406.

Bedford Lake – Some of the sweetest fishing in the area. Picnic area and boat rental is available. License and fee required. Call 931-857-3214.

Legends of Shelbyville Restaurant – The place for great steaks and so much more from delicious daily specials to a full bar. Open seven days a week. Located at 1609 North Main Street or call 931-680-7473.

⑥ Tullahoma

Tullahoma, Tennessee, is currently the only city in the world bearing that name. Since it was chartered in 1852, Tullahoma has been a health resort, a steadily growing industrial center, and the site of a large infantry-training center (Camp Forrest) during World War II, and now, headquarters for the world's largest aeronautical research project – Arnold Engineering Development Center (AEDC). This permanent aeronautical research-testing center has brought thousands of new residents, including scientists, engineers, skilled technicians and their families to Tullahoma, from all over the world.

Civil War Driving Trail – The Tullahoma Campaign started just after the end of the Battle of Stones' River in Murfreesboro and was the precursor to the Battle of

Chickamauga. The conquering of various small towns in the surrounding area helped the Union forces secure the road to Chattanooga and onward. This one hundred and thirty mile driving trail starts in Beechgrove, TN, located at Interstate Twenty-Four or call 931-454-9446.

George Dickel Distillery – Just a few years after Jack Daniels, George A. Dickel used the pure spring water from Cascade Hollow to distill his first bottle of Tennessee whisky. Dickel declared that because his whisky was as smooth as the finest scotch, he would always spell the "whiskey" in George Dickel Tennessee Whisky without an "e", keeping with the Scotch whisky tradition. The visitor's center is filled with antiques, photos, and others special memories. The distillery also features the only working post office at any distillery in the United States. Tour the distillery Tuesday through Saturday nine a.m. to four p.m.. Call 931-857-3124 ext. 230.

⑦ Wartrace

Founded in 1853, Wartrace is a beautiful village with Victorian and antebellum homes and buildings. The green rolling hills are the birthplace of the Tennessee Walking Horse. Wartrace is steeped in Civil War history, the American railroad, and Tennessee folk music. Enjoy live country, bluegrass, and gospel music at different locations on the town square.

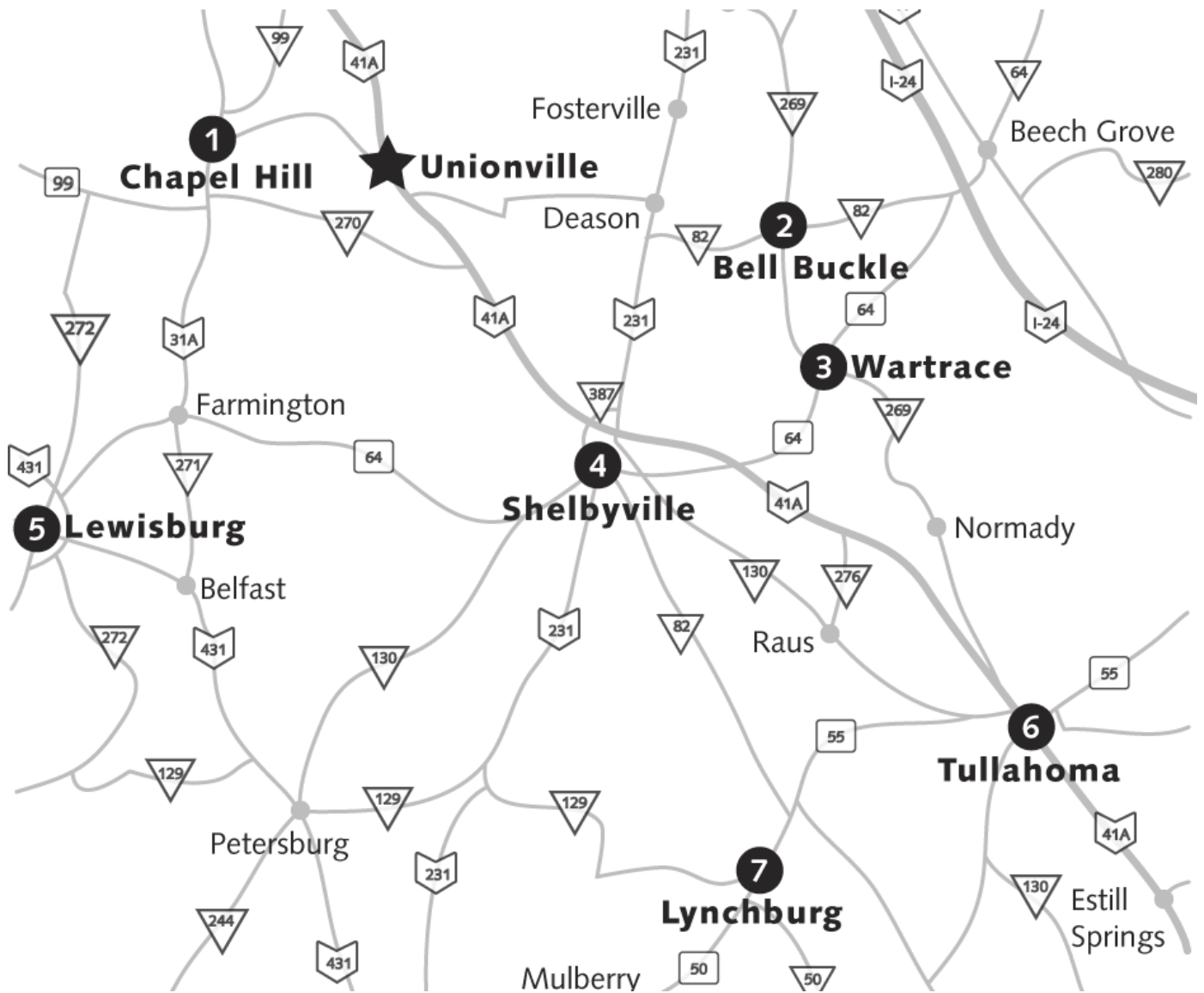
Walking Horse Hotel – Built in 1917 as the Overall Hotel, this twelve-room hotel was first used as an overnight stop for those traveling by the railroad. The hotel was later renamed the Walking Horse Hotel after Strolling Jim, the first world champion Tennessee Walking Horse, was buried behind the hotel. Located across from the square or call 931-389-7050.

Gallagher Guitars – Founded by J.W. Gallagher in 1965, this guitar shop makes some of the finest handmade acoustic guitars in the country. Doc Watson was one of the first celebrated guitar players to popularize this guitar. Stop by to play one of their instruments or to tour the shop. Located on the square or call 931-389-6455.

The Pickin' Parlor – This is the town's newest and best loved establishment. The Pickin' Parlor encourages musicians of any age or experience to join in and play. It is open Friday nights starting at six p.m. with no cover charge and free coffee. Soup, cornbread, chicken and dumplings are served up for just a few bucks. Located on the square.
